Listening to her spilling information over the warmth of go-juice (my name for coffee) you realize the passion she has for what she does.

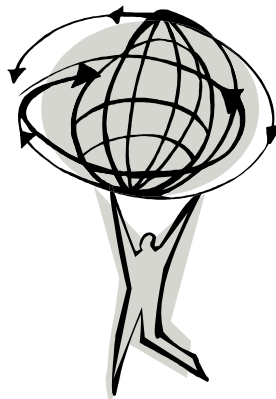
Technical KO does more than electronics, they also recycle alliances from the kitchen in homes and offices.

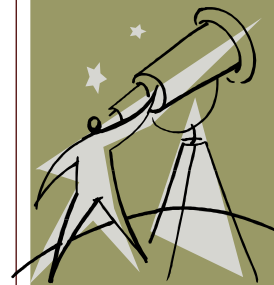

2 tons of electronics are discarded annually. 130 million cell phones will be discarded in 2008. (That's 260 million batteries, too) Cell phones contain the following toxins:

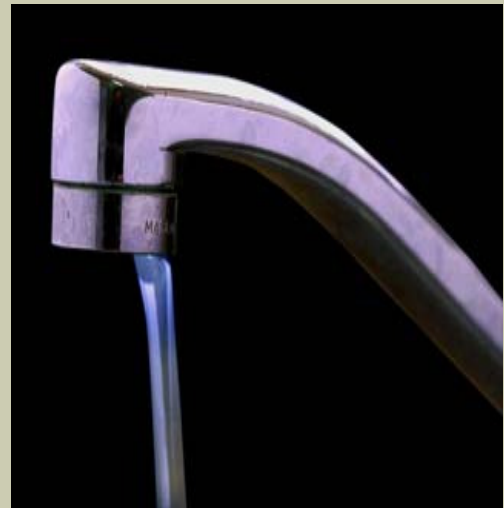
